NOTES FROM THE SIGNAL SYMPOSIUM

FORT GORDON, Georgia -- The United States Army Signal Center and Fort Gordon hosted the 32nd Signal Regimental Symposium from November 29 to December 3. Major Kim Farrier, BN S3, SM Karl Dornbush, S3 Operations NCO and I represented Edward D'Anna the 101st Signal Battalion during this five-day educational event giving our battalion the opportunity to meet and share information with Active, Reserve Paul Suchanyc and National Guard peers - learning first hand what the future holds for Army George Desimone National Guard Signalers. During the five days we met with top military and civilian experts, focusing on timely topics arising out of Operation Iraqi Freedom. We reviewed lessons learned directly from the 3rd Infantry G6 about equipment fielding, future force structure and new educational requirements affecting both enlisted and officer personnel. There were more than two hundred fifty exhibitors presenting the ultimate display of current and future cutting edge communications equipment, support services and combat solutions within sixty

thousand square feet of exhibit space.

The key to understanding our future lies within the theme for this year's symposium "LandWarNet " - Networking the Force in the Joint Fight. The Army Transformation is quickly preparing for the battlefield of the future. Where the soldier must see first, understand first and act first to finish decisively. This future is where the soldiers must assimilate vast amounts of information (voice, data and video conferencing), take what's relevant and use it to our advantage. And to give the soldier that advantage is LandWarNet.

LandWarNet is the new designation that represents the single embodiment for any and all of the systems and applications that will enable the future Networked Force. LandWarNet is similar to the Navy's Force Net initiative and Air Force's Command and Control Constellation. LandWarNet will bring together existing capabilities to include: Civilian Agencies, Commercial Networks, Homeland Defense, Host Nation Agencies, Joint Allied Coalition, Government Agencies, Non-Government Organizations, Global Information Grid Services, Special Operations, Home Station Operations Center and future capabilities to integrate the ground component into the Joint Operational Framework, ensuring seamless connectively with the Joint Force right down to the soldier on the front lines. LandWarNet will enable the army to collaborately plan and rapidly share an accurate picture of the battle space with the Joint Force Commander. LandWarNet will both feed and draw from this joint common picture. It will result in greater levels of situational awareness and it will generate increased combat power by better synchronization of joint efforts in the battle space achieving greater speed of command and increasing lethality, survivability and responsiveness. The network can also provide critical feedback to accurately determine mission effectiveness. LandWarNet will also improve and promote collaboration between commanders and staff, and it will support and facilitate connectivity to the home station and sustaining base. On the battlefield of the future the army is committed to providing soldiers with the best capabilities to receive process and transmit information. LandWarNet unifies the army's current networking efforts into a single strategy with its focus directly on the soldier, the centerpiece for which the army will build its future network. LandWarNet will increase the Army's war fighting capability
